The Master's Message for the New Year

Brethren of Arizona Lodge No 2, it is a genuine pleasure to serve you and the lodge as Master for the next year. I first realized that I wanted to sit in the East early in my Masonic journey. Mind you, I didn't want the office for any sense of accolade. Rather, I wanted the challenge of leadership that I felt was holding me back from being a better man. I wanted to serve the lodge and the craft by gradually taking on more responsibilities. Janus is the ancient Roman god of beginnings, transitions, doorways, and duality, famously depicted with two faces looking in opposite directions (past and future, east and west), symbolizing time, passages, and choices, with the month of January being named for him. He is also the god of "gates" and is appropriately associated with the changing of the guard, from one officer to the next. The cycle continues, and we endeavor to persevere and grow as a due result.

I am looking forward to serving you for the next year. I am open to any brother day or night to call upon me for any reason. This is no different than any other day or night, but now is the time for me to emphasize it to you, my brethren. You can call me to study, vent, cry, pontificate, postulate, or offer anything for the good of Freemasonry or our lodge specifically.

Happy New Year



The plumb's symbolism promotes an unwavering commitment to ethical conduct, balancing ambition with humility and fostering rectitude in personal and fraternal dealings. In Masonic teachings, the plumb serves as a constant reminder to test one's values against principles of justice and morality, reinforcing that true enduring strength arises from unyielding integrity.
