Cory Whalin In Freemasonry, time is one of the most valuable gifts a Brother can offer. Unlike material possessions, time cannot be replaced or reclaimed once given. When a Brother dedicates his time—whether in Lodge meetings, charitable endeavors, or simply offering guidance to another—he demonstrates one of the highest virtues of our Craft: service to others. To appreciate someone's time is to recognize the silent labor that sustains the harmony and progress of our fraternity. Each moment spent in the service of Light contributes to the building of that spiritual temple within and among us. As Masons, we are taught to measure time not by hours or days, but by the good we accomplish within them. Thus, gratitude toward those who share their time is not merely courtesy—it is a moral duty. When we pause to thank a Brother for his time, we affirm the sacred bond of fellowship that unites us. We acknowledge that his time, freely given, is a reflection of his commitment to our shared principles of Brotherly Love, Relief, and Truth. In doing so, we strengthen the timeless chain of friendship and remind ourselves that, in Masonry, time well spent is time well honored. The Importance and Benefit by S.W. Kevin Prier The ritual we use for opening and closing the lodge, or for conferring degrees, is a part of Freemasonry that is only given to the candidate after receiving a given degree. It contains the "vernacular" of a Mason as well as the explanations of our various symbols and allegory. For me, this was enough to inspire me to learn it as quickly as possible. Learning it requires memorizing entire sections or all of the speech and floor work for a given office. It may seem daunting at first. You may not know where to start. You may think certain parts aren't for you yet. And this is where I would disagree. The parts are for you as soon as you have them in your possession. The first part I learned in the Lodge was a small speech for the first degree. Next I started learning all the speech for a given office like Junior Deacon. Then, before you know it, the lodge needed someone to be appointed to one of those seats, and I was one of the only ones who was both available and knew the part. The same thing happened a couple more times - now I'm about to sit in the East. In conclusion, it's been my experience that seriously applying yourself to learning the ritual has nothing but positive effects on your Masonic journey.
