Wisdom from the East

President & Brother George Washington

272 years ago this month, August 4th, 1753 - the father of our Country became a Master Mason. Some might think that Masons merely "Latch onto" George Washington to bring favor onto our fraternity. The life of George Washington tells a different story. Past Grand Master James Raymond Malott (1936) believed that Washington embodied the values of a Mason. In 1924, as Grand Orator, he gave this oration at the Grand Communication of the Grand Lodge of Arizona:

"...True Masonic work by the individual includes work for the organization, as such, and work outside the organization consisting of an application of Masonic principles to the problems and conditions of everyday life. Probably the most brilliant and successful example of such work in our country is illustrated in the life of our first President, George Washington. Our Most Worshipful Grand Master has spoke today of his recent trip to Alexandria where he and all of the other Grand Masters of the United States took part in laying the Corner-stone of the Masonic Memorial to George Washington. Possibly some of you felt, as I did at one time, and wondered if Masonry was not attempting to capitalize for its own benefit the great achievements of the founder of our Republic. I confess that I did not then realize how truly that revered Brother exemplified those virtues which we all regard as Masonic. As a Mason he attempted to practice outside of the Lodge those great moral duties which are inculcated in it.

We find a record of his belief in a Divine Creator and a reliance upon his God which he was not ashamed to publicly express. We find him practicing charity and even while engaged as Commander in Chief of the Revolutionary Army he took time to write to the Superintendent of his estate insisting that the policy of his home be maintained so that none should leave there hungry or in want. He was noted for his poise which indicated he had learned to subdue his passions. As one necessary method for the dissemination of truth he believed in education, and we find him supporting the schools of the day because he realized that public education was a necessity in a Republic, But he did not stop with a mere oral expression in favor of public education. He was not an advocate of public schools who failed to attend board elections. He personally established the first free school in Alexandria and for many years contributed to the college training of young men of his acquaintance. He believed in the equality of man and truly proved the honesty of that belief, for, when after the surrender of Cornwallis, an almost universal demand went up that Washington become king of this country, he declined to consider such an appointment. He felt that a government could be established on a new model which need not include any kings or classes on a higher basis than the balance of mankind. During the five years preceding the constitutional convention and during that great convention he and his other Masonic Brethren prepared and wrote into our fundamental law the Masonic principle, that all men are equal before the law."
